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Not long ago, I was invited to speak at my alma mater, the University of Alabama, for The Helen Crow Mills and John Carroll Mills Lecture Series. It was established and endowed to bring “successful and distinguished alumni to campus to inspire and motivate students.” As I made my way across the Quad to the lecture hall, I was overwhelmed with emotion.

I remembered the long nights I spent studying while my babies slept, whispered prayers before exams, the countless hours I spent developing and fine-tuning my Capstone dissertation project and the fierce belief that somehow, through hard work and God’s grace, I’d make it. It was pure grit and determination that sustained me. Now, to return as a mentor to others brought me to tears of gratitude and also disbelief.

I was asked to talk about leadership and impact. What I shared with those students is something I’ve come to know deep in my heart: just like my time at BAMA, there are no shortcuts when it comes to changing lives. It takes determination. It takes follow-through. But most of all, it takes passion and an unrelenting, unwavering dedication to doing whatever it takes to better the health and well-being of our West Virginia neighbors in need.

That’s the story of West Virginia Health Right.

Back in 1995, when I first walked into the old clinic location on Smith Street as a young nurse practitioner student, it instantly felt like I was home. The purity of the mission and focus on compassionate care, not the bottom line, drew me in. But I never imagined I’d one day become CEO, or that we’d grow from a single clinic serving 15,000 patients to an innovative, one-stop shop, model of care fueled by volunteers, reaching over 47,000 West Virginians in 2025 alone.

But that growth didn’t happen overnight. And it sure didn’t happen because it was easy. It happened because we refused to give up, and when we saw a need, we didn’t close our eyes or turn our head.

When we were told, “It can’t be done,” we rolled up our sleeves and said, “We’ll find a way.”

The impact we’ve achieved in 2025 is the result of that mindset and a commitment to following through. It’s the collective power of our dedicated, talented, and trusted staff who do not flinch when faced with insurmountable obstacles.

This past year we expanded our behavioral health, recovery, and workforce development efforts. Our Mobile Clinics went farther than ever before to provide care. And we unveiled our Mobile Teaching Kitchen—a new way for us to bring disease prevention through nutrition education directly to communities across the state—with the help of Governor Patrick Morrisey and the First Lady.

All of WV Health Right’s services and programs are designed to be integrated. This is because we recognize that a person’s overall health is the sum of everything that impacts their well-being. This includes stable housing, job security, comprehensive mental healthcare, and access to medical and dental care. When someone gets all the care they need to feel whole, they can work and stay gainfully employed for the long haul. They can be there for their families. And, they can turn around and lift up someone else once they are financially able. That’s the kind of impact that lasts for generations. That’s the kind of community WV Health Right helps build.

I think back to that younger version of myself, working full-time at the clinic and being a mother to my young kids (three were still in diapers at the time), while being a full-time Doctoral student. Looking back on those days, I know it was prayer and that burning desire and refusal to fail or quit that got me to the finish line. Walking across that graduation stage in August of 2014, while my family looked on, was one of the proudest moments in my life.

But that was just the beginning, for what we have accomplished together at WV Health Right over the last 11 years is nothing short of a miracle. I found my life’s purpose at the helm of this amazing organization, and, thankfully, I’m joined by an equally amazing staff and a group of selfless volunteers. There’s still work to do, but I have no doubt, together, we’ll find a way.

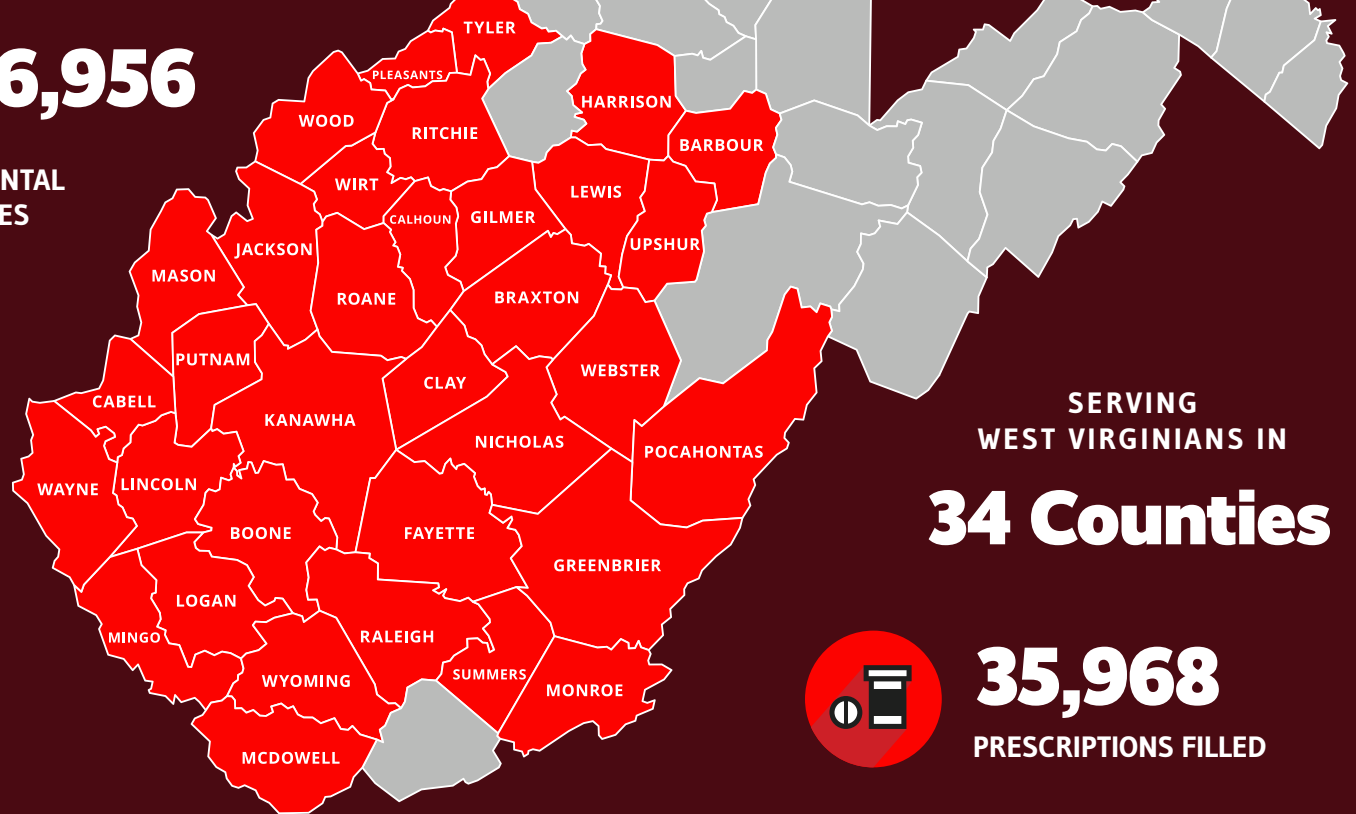

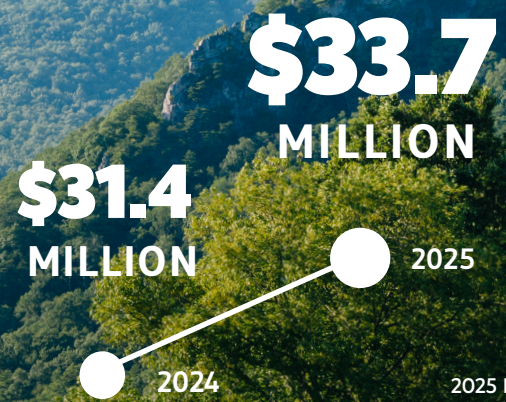

On #WeCareWV Day this year, more than 500 people received free medical, dental, vision, and wraparound care.

It was a single day that took months of planning, hundreds of volunteers, and a coordinated team effort. It was also a clear reflection of how WV Health Right does what it takes to find a way.

To us, finding a way means adapting to what's in front of us, staying focused on what matters, and getting people the care they need, when they need it. Whether it's on one extraordinary day or on an ordinary one, finding a way is what we do.

Often our patients work one and sometimes two or more jobs, doing backbreaking, lower-wage shift work that communities rely on. For families living at or below the poverty line, the cost of an eye exam isn't just the co-pay. It is lost wages, extra fuel for the drive, and the risk that it all adds up to a rent check that can't clear at the end of the month.

But it doesn't stop there. Distance complicates care. Cost delays it. Insurance gaps interrupt it.

Sometimes finding a way means going beyond traditional clinic walls and adjusting how care is delivered. If patients can't travel, our Mobile Units do. If a solution doesn't exist, we build one from the ground up.

Like our workforce development initiative, Prepped to Serve Appalachia, and our Mobile Teaching Kitchen, which supports disease prevention through nutrition education.

In 2025, we served more than 47,000 patients across 34 counties.

They were mostly uninsured (52%), mostly working (82% of households), and mostly out of options—until they found us.

THE RIGHT QUESTION HAS A WAY OF CHANGING EVERYTHING

“It’s good that people can come to us in Charleston. But there are so many people in need across rural West Virginia who can’t.

So why don’t we try to take this to them?”

That question didn’t come from a strategy session. It came from boots on the ground experience and listening to patients talk about long drives, missed work, and untreated illnesses. From collaborating with partners who understand their communities and the gaps in care that exist there. When programs are built with communities rather than for them, they’re more likely to be used and trusted. This is the foundation of how our mobile services came to be.

MOBILE DENTAL CLINIC



Our first mobile program, the Mobile Dental Clinic, grew from our experience working in flood-impacted communities throughout the state back in 2016.

We saw first-hand how often lack of access to care was keeping people in dental pain and out of work. Using the ER to treat their recurrent pain and infection was the only option. The question wasn’t whether dental care mattered to folks who weren’t seeking it out. It was how we could deliver it in a way that reached them where they were. The answer was to bring a fully equipped mobile clinic into rural, underserved communities.

By partnering with Marshall Health, the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, and local healthcare delivery partners around the state, we’re now able to focus on relieving pain, addressing infection, and helping thousands of people improve their lives and livelihoods.

MOBILE MEDICAL CLINIC

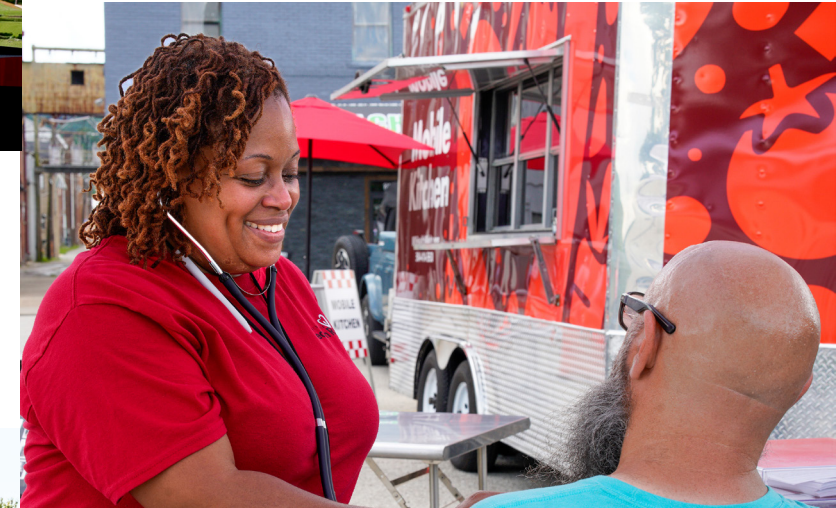


Our Mobile Medical Clinic follows the same path.

By traveling to different locations each week, we can offer services in places where access has been limited by distance and time.

Testing, prevention, education, and treatment can, for the first time, be close to home. These visits often lead to referrals and follow-up care that continues long after the clinic has moved on to the next stop. That’s the kind of continuity that research shows improves health over time.

MOBILE TEACHING KITCHEN



The Mobile Teaching Kitchen came from another practical question.

How do we talk about disease prevention and the use of food as medicine in a way that feels useful and approachable? By showing up at churches, fairs, festivals, and community events, the kitchen creates space for learning, screenings, and connection. It introduces people to nutrition education alongside our clinical services, and it does so in places where people already feel comfortable gathering.

Our mobile services exist because we’re willing to ask the right questions.

They continue because our partners, volunteers, and the communities we serve across West Virginia help to shape the answer, resulting in programs that center patients’ needs and truly meet them where they are. That is the power of care delivered by WV Health Right on country roads across the Mountain State.

“They did more for me in 10 minutes than I’ve been able to do in years,” one patient said.

And a first-time volunteer described it as, “just a beautiful thing that benefits the whole community.”

Powered by more than 200 volunteers, #WeCareWV Day served nearly 500 patients with medical, dental, vision, and preventive services—all in a single Saturday in October. That included 135 dental procedures, 100 vision exams, 216 medical visits, plus flu shots, mammograms, HIV/HCV tests, and more.



That volume and caliber of care, at no cost to the patient, is only possible when a community rolls up its sleeves, works together, and shows what’s achievable when you’re determined to keep hardworking West Virginians from falling through the cracks.

Every year, he steps up to lead vision services at #WeCareWV Day. When the clinic is packed and the hours are long, his leadership makes the day run smoothly—and more importantly, it helps our patients feel cared for and seen.

There's a moment from one of our free clinics that says so much about him. He saw an older gentleman who hadn't had his eyes checked in years. What should have been a routine vision exam turned into something far more serious. Dr. Stansbury found a tumor beside the retina—a cancer that could have gone unnoticed. Because he took the time to look closer, that man was able to begin life-saving treatment.

That's the kind of care that stays with you long after clinic hours and keeps us inspired to keep doing this vital work.

We are proud to recognize Dr. Chris Stansbury as our 2025 Volunteer of the Year. His volunteerism reflects the best of who we are—a community of people showing up for one another with skill, kindness, and an unwavering commitment to help those in need in West Virginia.
